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### 1 TECHNICAL DETAILS

### 1.1 General Information

The FS22 - Industrial BraggMETER SI with real time embedded Smart Peak Detection (SPD) is a continuous swept laser scanning interrogator specifically designed to interrogate Fiber Bragg Grating (FBG) based sensors in industrial environments.

BraggMETER interrogators include a NIST traceable wavelength reference that provides continuous calibration to ensure system accuracy over long term operation. The high dynamic range and high output power combined with the Smart Peak Detection (SPD) allow high resolution to be attained even for long fiber leads and lossy connections.

Multiple sensors can be connected in series in each optical fiber, in combination with one, four or eight optical channels with parallel acquisition. The FS22 - Industrial BraggMETER SI is particularly suitable for large scale sensing networks acquiring a large number of sensors simultaneously and providing 1 S/s acquisition rates with sub picometer resolution.

The BraggMETER is available either in Standard and Rack-mountable formats. This Manual applies to the following equipment:

### 1.3 Software

FS22SI Interrogators are delivered with BraggMONITOR SI software that enables easy device configuration, data viewing, saving and management, and can operate as a simple interface for command communication.

These interrogators can be integrated into any system through SCPI like commands (ASCII strings). LabView Drivers are also available for third party integration. # 1.4 Synchronization

FS22 follows the NTP synchronization via Ethernet method, using an external NTP server.



# 2.2 Laser Safety

The FS22 - Industrial BraggMETER SI contains a laser in its core. A laser is a light source that can be dangerous to people exposed to it. Even low power lasers can be hazardous to a person's eyesight. The coherence and low divergence of laser light means that it can be focused by the eye into an extremely small spot on the retina, resulting in localized burning and permanent damage.

The lasers are classified by wavelength and maximum output power into the several safety classes: Class 1, Class 1 M, Class 2, Class 2 M, Class 3R and Class 4.

# 2.2.1 Symbols



### 2.2.2 Class 1 Laser

The FS22 - Industrial BraggMETER SI is a class 1 laser product:

«Any laser or laser system containing a laser that cannot emit laser radiation at levels that are known to cause eye or skin injury during normal operation. »

It is safe under all conditions of normal use. No safety requirements are needed to use Class 1 laser devices. This product contains a laser within an enclosure that prevents exposure to the radiation and that cannot be opened without shutting down the laser.

### 2.2.3 General Precautions Considerations

Everyone who uses a laser equipment should be aware of the risks.

The laser radiation is not visible to the human eye but it can seriously damage user's eyesight.

The laser is enabled when the interrogator is turned on.

Users should never put their eyes at the level of the horizontal plane of the optical adapters of the interrogator or uncovered optical connectors.

Adequate eye protection should always be required if there is a significant risk for eye injury.

When an optical connector is not in use (no optical cable plugged to the interrogator), a proper connector cap must be used. The optical connectors are subjected to maintenance and/or inspection. *Please refer to section 4.4.1 "Dirty Connector" for maintenance procedure.* 

Do not attempt to open or repair a malfunctioning interrogator. It must be returned to HBK FiberSensing for repair and calibration.

# **3 OPERATION**

# 3.1 Connectors

### 3.1.1 Standard




Fig. 3.1 Front and back views of FS22SI Standard

The connectors and buttons on Fig. 3.1 are:

- 1 Optical Output Connectors
- 2 ON/OFF Button
- 3 Power Connector
- 4 Ethernet Connector
- 5 POWER and STATUS LEDs

# 3.1.2 Rack-Mountable




Fig. 3.2 Front and back views of FS22SI Rack-Mountable

The connectors and buttons on Fig. 3.2 are:

- 1 ON/OFF Button
- 2 POWER and STATUS LEDs
- 3 Optical Output Connectors
- 4 Power Connector
- 5 Electric fuse
- 6 Safety Power Button
- 7 Fans
- 8 Ethernet Connector

# 3.2 Setting Up

### 3.2.1 Power Supply

To start the FS22 - Industrial BraggMETER SI interrogator connect the power cable to the interrogator Power Connector (number **3** on *Fig. 3.1* or number **4** on *Fig. 3.2*). To acknowledge proper power supply, the POWER LED will turn green during 2 seconds after connecting the power supply.



### Information

For the Standard version of the interrogator the power supply must have a minimum of 30 W, with an output voltage between 12-36 v and must withstand a peak of 4 A for at least 4 ms. For the Rack-Mountable version of the interrogator the power must be 100-240 V AC, 50-60 Hz, 1A.

### Notice

Powering above the specified limits will damage the equipment. For the Rack-mountable version there is a fuse protection that can be replaced. please see section 4.4.5 Fuse failure.



### Information

The interrogator must be powered using a power supply source not shared with other equipment's. A replacement AC-DC power supply unit 24 V (1-NTX001) for the Standard version or Power Cable (1-KAB274) available with different plug formats can be ordered from HBK.

# 3.2.2 Optical Connectors

The FS22 - Industrial BraggMETER SI can be purchased either with FC/APC, or SC/APC optical connectors. *number* **1** *on Fig. 3.1* exemplifies FC/APC connectors.

Attention should be paid to the cleaning of the optical connectors. A dirty connector can compromise the measurement and will degrade the interrogator performance. It is advisable to frequently clean the connectors using appropriate tools.

FS22 - Industrial BraggMETER SI can have one, four or eight optical channels in parallel.

### 3.2.3 Ethernet Connection

Connect the Ethernet RJ45 connector directly to a PC using a Ethernet cross-over cable, or to a network connector using a direct Ethernet cable (in this case, the FS22 - Industrial BraggMETER SI must be in the same subnet as your Local Network).



### **Important**

The interrogator default network configuration is "10.0.0.10:255.0.0.0:0.0.0.0".

### 3.2.4 Positioning

When installing the FS22 interrogator, please exercise caution regarding its placement.

The FS22 interrogator can be positioned in any orientation without impacting its functionality, providing that the remaining environmental conditions as specified on the data sheet are observed. However, it is essential to handle the fiber optic cables connected to the optical channels with care to avoid strain or damage. Pay careful attention to rack doors or cabinet lids that may force, twist or pinch the cables (optical or electrical) compromising measured signals.

### 3.3 Maintenance

# 3.3.1 Wear parts

HBK Optical Interrogators have wear parts (such as ventilation fans, optical connector adapters and batteries) that require minimum running conditions to ensure a correct operation of the equipment.

Wear parts are covered by a limited warranty as they are components that depend on the usage and on the environmental conditions the equipment operates in, such as humidity, temperature and dust.

A periodic maintenance should be planned and managed by the customer considering the actual operation conditions. Warranty will only be applied to wear parts if the cause of the defect can be clearly traced back to the material or manufacturing fault.

### 3.3.2 Ventilation

The FS22SI is an electronic equipment with active ventilation, meaning that it uses fans for thermal control of the device. Fine dust particles over time can reduce the life time of optical and electronic components leading to a general degradation of the equipment, so it is important to prevent dust from entering the device. For that reason the interrogators should be kept on a controlled environment, far or protected from major dust areas.

### 3.3.3 Optical connectors

Optical connectors of the interrogator are subject to degradation and can actually break upon misusage (see section 4.4.2. Broken Connector). If this happens, the interrogator must be sent back to HBK FiberSensing for repair.

### 3.3.4 Calibration

BraggMETER interrogators have a built-in NIST traceable gas cell that ensures calibrated measurements at all time. For this reason, a compulsory periodic calibration is not required. Nevertheless, for regulatory reasons or internal rules, a periodic certified calibration procedure is sometimes required. For those cases, the calibration service is available and can be requested to HBK FiberSensing.

# 3.4 Switching On

Pressing the ON/OFF button will start the interrogator. The STATUS LED will start blinking at 2 Hz. After approximately 30 seconds it will start blinking at 1 Hz. This means that the interrogator is already on and responsive, but the optoelectronic module is still warming up. After approximately 90 seconds it should stay on permanently. This means that the interrogator is able to measure.




Fig. 3.4 Power ON/OFF button and status LED behavior



### Information

If the interrogator does not start correctly, the STATUS LED will blink faster. If this happens please contact HBK FiberSensing technical support.

# 3.5 Switching OFF




Fig. 3.5 Power LED while pressing Switching Off between 2 s and 6 s

To avoid accidental shut-down of the interrogator, it is necessary to press the "ON/OFF" button between 2 and 6 seconds (Fig. 3.5).




Fig. 3.6 Power LED while pressing Switching Off between 6 s and 10 s

If for some reason the 6 seconds are exceeded the user can release the button before 10 seconds are reached and the interrogator will remain ON (*Fig. 3.6*).

### Notice

If the ON/OFF button is pressed more than 10 seconds irreversible changes on the interrogator configuration are performed.

# 3.6 Operating the Interrogator

### 3.6.1 Network Properties

To operate the FS22 - Industrial BraggMETER SI from a personal computer, the PC network properties should be set so that both elements are configured in the same subnet.

To configure your personal computer so that it is on the same subnet as the default for the interrogator, proceed as follows:

- On the control panel choose Network Connections.




Fig. 3.7 Local Area Connection Status

- Select the LAN connection. The window displayed in Fig. 3.7 will appear. Click on Properties.




Fig. 3.8 Local Area connection properties

▶ Select the Internet Protocol (TCP/IP) and click on the button **Properties** (Fig. 3.8).




Fig. 3.9 Internet Protocol Version 4 Properties

Set the IP address and the subnet mask as in Fig. 3.9.

Press OK.

# 3.6.2 Resetting the IP Address of the Interrogator

If for any chance there is the need to physically change the IP address of the interrogator, there is a reset procedure that consists on pressing the ON/OFF button for more than 10 seconds.

When the button is being pressed for 10 seconds the POWER LED blinks 3 times and goes OFF. At this moment the ON/OFF button can be released and the reset of IP address will happen.




Fig. 3.10 Power LED while pressing Switching Off for more than 10 s

This procedure resets the interrogator changing its IP address to the default and its measuring settings to the last stored.



### Information

The interrogator default network properties are "10.0.0.10:255.0.0.0:0.0.0.0".

### 3.6.3 Synchronization

In order to achieve synchronous measurements between different devices the NTP (Network Time Protocol) synchronization via Ethernet must be used.

Each optical Interrogator can synchronize its internal clock with an NTP server. It is possible to achieve accuracies of 1ms or higher, depending on whether or not a dedicated NTP server is being used.

# Measuring Systems Typology

A measurement system can be as simple as a single interrogator or a bit more complex with combined interrogators with the same or different sampling rates, and interrogators combined with other equipment.

### Single interrogator

For the usage of a single interrogator no special synchronization is needed.

BraggMONITOR SI software can only operate one interrogator at a time. If an NTP server is running on the same PC as the BraggMONITOR SI, the interrogator internal clock – hence BraggMONITOR SI – will sync.

# Multiple interrogators

If more than one interrogator is used, synchronization becomes important and if an NTP server is running the equipment will start synching as soon as a first communication from the server is received.




Fig. 3.11 Synchronizing multiple interrogators

### Hybrid

A hybrid measurement system is a system composed by different equipment types and technologies that can be operated with different sampling rates. Taking the example of HBK families a hybrid system could be a combination of Interrogators with QuantumX.




Fig. 3.12 Synchronizing interrogators with conventional technology

Synchronization is again of extreme importance in such systems. When an NTP server is running the Interrogator will start synching as soon as a first communication from the server is received.

For details on the other equipment please refer to their respective user manuals.

### **Synchronization process**

Each interrogator synchronizes its internal clock with the NTP server. Upon starting, all devices and the NTP server need some settling time to achieve the best synchronism possible.

The following features for NTP synchronization are available:

Number of devices to be synchronized	Unlimited
Synchronization accuracy	10 µs to 10 ms
Synchronization settling time	Up to 30 min during first start, up to 2 min during restart
Synchronization master	External SyncMaster, e.g. PC

For a good synchronization, the dedicated NTP server should run continuously. The accuracy is described by the two values:

- Offset: average deviation from time server
- Jitter: typical variation range of the offset value

The clock synchronization is classified using the following offset intervals:

<500 µs: excellent</p>

<1 ms: very good</p>

<2 ms: good</p>

<5 ms: acceptable</p>

<10ms: poor</p>

>10ms: not acceptable

A successful NTP Sync is achieved if the offset between the internal clock of the device and the NTP server is below 5ms.

The quality of the NTP synchronization can be queried using the SCPI commands (please refer to section "Synchronization" on page 53 for further details).

# 3.6.4 Operation

The FS22 - Industrial BraggMETER SI interrogator can be fully controlled using standard SCPI syntax commands (for a complete command list, please refer to section 5.1 "Communication Protocol Syntax" on page 38).

# **Using the Provided Drivers**

These drivers can be used within the LabVIEW<sup>TM</sup> environment. To develop custom applications using this language, copy the drivers' library supplied on the CD. A set of ready to use examples to run on LabVIEW<sup>TM</sup> is also provided.



### Important

Before using the provided LabVIEW $^{TM}$  examples on a PC, make sure the Regional and Language options (in standards and formats) are defined as dot for decimal symbol, comma for digit grouping symbol and dash for date separation.

### **Operational States**

The FS22 - Industrial BraggMETER SI interrogator has six operational states:

**0 Error** The error state corresponds to a malfunction of the optoelec-

tronic module of the interrogator. The system can only recover

from this state by resetting.

1 Ready In the ready state, the FS22 - Industrial BraggMETER SI is ready

to start acquisition.

**2 Free acquisition** The free acquisition state enables the FS22 - Industrial

BraggMETER SI interrogator to perform single measurements on a specified optical channel. The interrogator can be configured in terms of threshold and the corresponding configuration can

be stored for further measurements.

3 Continuous acquisition

The continuous acquisition state allows continuous wavelength acquisition over all optical channels and also performs continu-

ous OSA trace acquisition at 1 S/s.

4 Scheduled acquisition

The scheduled acquisition state allows periodic data acquisition with a pre-defined period and number of samples while saving data to the internal interrogator memory. Whenever the acquisition period minus the number of samples (at 1 S/s rate) is higher than 10 minutes, the interrogator will enter into sleep mode during inactive time intervals, to reduce power consumption. The minimum period is 5 s and the number of samples (at 1 S/s)

cannot overcome the defined period.

**5 Warming-up** The FS22 - Industrial BraggMETER SI interrogator starts on the

warming-up state that enables the settling of the operation parameters and recall of the acquisition configuration.



### Information

The interrogator will only answer when the STATUS LED is already blinking at 1 Hz (see section 3.4 "Switching On" on page 16).




Fig. 3.13 Operational States and commands

# **Power Shortage**

If a power shortage happens when the - FS22 Industrial BraggMETER SI interrogator is running in the ready, free acquisition or continuous acquisition states, the operational state is maintained once the power supply is reestablished with the stored acquisition settings.

If the power shortage occurs in the scheduled acquisition mode, the operational state is maintained once the power supply is reestablished except in the case the interrogator is in sleep mode for power saving.

### **Notice**

If the interrogator is in sleep mode when a power shortage occurs, scheduling will not resume upon power up.

### **Default Network Properties**

The default network properties are "10.0.0.10:255.0. 0.0:0.0.0.0". Whenever there is the need, the interrogator can be reset to this default address (see section 3.6.2 "Resetting the IP Address of the Interrogator" on page 20). The default address cannot be changed.

### 4 MEASURING

# 4.1 Typical Configuration




Fig. 4.1 Typical network configuration

Typically, a fiber Bragg grating Sensing Network is divided into branches of several sensors connected in series. On *Fig. 4.1* there is a scheme of a usual fiber Bragg grating sensing branch.

A branch can accommodate sensors with wavelengths between 1500 nm to 1600 nm. The number of sensors in an optical connector can vary if there is previous knowledge about the spectral range the sensors will cover. The major concern is the overlap of adjacent sensors. The available optical connectors have simultaneous acquisition, meaning that the sensing network can have a large number of fiber Bragg grating sensors interrogated at the same time.

The employed technology allows multi-functionality meaning that on the same branch it is possible to measure Strain, Temperature, Displacement, Pressure, Acceleration, etc...

The sensing network can be placed several kilometers from the interrogator without significant losses on transmission over the optical fiber, operating under EM/RF interferences.

Each fiber Bragg grating sensor has a characteristic central wavelength  $(\lambda_0)$  that depends only on the measurand. This means that with this technology there is no need for recalibrations every time the system is shut down. The FS22 - Industrial BraggMETER SI is a ruggedized interrogator designed for standalone operation.

### 4.2 Definitions

The following definitions are applicable to this equipment only.

# 4.2.1 Wavelength




Fig. 4.2 Wavelength

The Wavelength value corresponds to the wavelength at the peak of the fiber Bragg grating reflection spectrum, commonly referred as Bragg wavelength (Fig. 4.2).

### 4.2.2 Power




Fig. 4.3 Power

The Power value corresponds to the optical power reflected by the fiber Bragg grating at the peak wavelength (*Fig. 4.3*).

### 4.3 Measurement Methods

BraggMETER interrogators incorporate two distinct measurement methods. The Conventional in which a global threshold is considered for the detection and measurement of the fiber Bragg grating sensors and the Smart peak Detection (SPD), in which individual configurable sensor ranges are used combined with a defined threshold for the optical channel, referenced to the peak inside each range.

### 4.3.1 Conventional




Fig. 4.4 Conventional detection method

In the conventional measuring approach, the threshold level is defined in dB for each optical channel individually and it is defined from the maximum peak power of the channel (refer to Fig. 4.4). The threshold value corresponds to the considered power level for the FBG peak computation, so that side lobes and ground noise are disregarded. Although it is considered an expedited way of performing measurements, the use of this method should be limited to laboratory applications with reduced power losses between sensors.



### **Important**

When measuring with the conventional method the configuration of all sensors can be affected by local insertion losses. If power losses are expected (field applications) the SPD method is recommended.

### 4.3.2 Smart Peak Detection (SPD)




Fig. 4.5 Smart Peak Detection (SPD) detection method

SPD allows the effective use of the high dynamic range offered by the interrogator through the introduction of individual and adaptive thresholds, referenced to the peak on each sensor's configurable range (refer to Fig. 4.5).

As in the conventional measuring method, the threshold value corresponds to the considered power level for the FBG peak computation and it is defined in dB for each optical channel individually. The difference on the SPD is that the threshold value is referenced to the highest peak of each range, operating individually in every range.

Within each sensor range, even though it happens, either permanently or occasionally, that multiple peaks overcome the threshold, only one FBG sensor will be computed, thus eliminating problems indexed to the measurements. Additionally, any influence these spurious peaks could exert on the measurements is canceled.

Summarily, the increased robustness provided is especially suited to overcome the limitations found in the conventional methods where low and high reflectivity FBGs coexist and signal losses are often a problem. SPD therefore improves the stability and accuracy of the measurements, contributing to the system's efficiency.



### Information

When SPD is active, the total number of sensors that can be measured by the interrogator should not exceed 400.

# 4.4 Common Measuring Difficulties

There may be the possibility of having measuring malfunctions due to several problems in the sensing network or optical connections. A list of some of the usual problems is described below with the explanation for its occurrence and correction.

### 4.4.1 Dirty Connector




Fig. 4.6 Magnified Clean vs Dirty connector

When an interrogator is repeatedly being plugged in and out with optical connectors, it is very important that the connectors are cleaned prior to any connection. If not, dust and moisture can be deposited in the interrogator adaptor and this will compromise measurements. On *Fig. 4.6* a picture of a magnified connector is presented. The dark gray circle corresponds to the fiber cladding and the small light gray circle is the core of the fiber. One picture for a clean connector and one picture for a dusty connector are presented.

The most common effect of dirt on the connections is that there is a large amount of broad band light being reflected at the connection, at both directions, meaning that the dynamic range for measuring becomes smaller.




Fig. 4.7 Dirt impact on sensor signal

To clean an optical interrogator adapter, use an appropriate cleaner (1-FSCLEANER from HBK or similar). Insert it in the optical adapter, number 1 in *Fig. 4.8*, and press it against the inside of the connector to clean.

Alternatively, use an appropriate cotton swab (there are several cleaning swabs in the market frequently used for telecom) embedded in isopropyl alcohol. Insert it in the optical adapter, number **2** in *Fig. 4.8*, and rotate the swab always on the same direction.

### 4.4.2 Broken Connector

It may also occur that the interrogator adapter sleeve breaks. In this case, when an optical connector is inserted it does not get proper alignment and measurements are compromised. A broken sleeve will look as shown in *Fig. 4.9*.

To solve this problem you should contact HBK FiberSensing.

### 4.4.3 Reflective Fiber Ending

It may occur that the interrogator does not find any sensor on an array even if connections were performed correctly. One of the reasons may be the excess of reflected light saturating the detectors.




Fig. 4.10 Refraction and reflection at fiber end

When a fiber is perfectly cut (Fig. 4.10 on the left) a large amount of light is reflected right back into the core of the fiber in such an angle that it gets guided back heading to the interrogator detectors. When this occurs, an index matching gel or an angled termination must be used. If these are unavailable, the tip of the fiber can be smashed with a metallic tool. This will destroy the perfect geometry (*Fig. 4.10 on the right*) and the light that is reflected at the surface will take random directions ending up outside the core.

### 4.4.4 Cut Fiber

When the fiber, for any reason, is broken between two sensors in a series, the sensors that are after the fault may disappear from the optical spectrum and may not be detected.




Fig. 4.11 Cut fiber effect

There may also be the case that the fiber is cut, but not completely spread apart (e.g. the fiber is damaged in an area covered with glue). This will cause a Fabry-Pérot effect – the light will suffer multiple reflections inside the cavity creating sinusoidal background reflection. *Fig. 4.11* shows a schematic representation of the reflected spectrum for these three presented cases.

### 4.4.5 Fuse Failure

Electrical shorts on the power supply may cause problems to the interrogators. The Industrial BraggMETER SI on its Rack-Mountable format is directly connected to the

100-240 V power line meaning that it has no external protection. Replaceable fuses are available on the interrogator's back-side next to the power connector (*number 5 in Fig. 3.2*). To replace the fuses, release the top and bottom springs of the fuses' support (*Fig. 4.12*) and then remove the piece (*Fig. 4.13*).

Rated voltage: 250 Volt ACInterrupting rate: 1 Ampere

The Standard format of the interrogator is powered at 11-36 VDC, which means that the electrical protection should be granted by the power source or the adapter. If, by any chance, the power supply is overcome, the interrogator might be damaged and need repair at HBK FiberSensing.

#### 5.1 **Communication Protocol Syntax**

The interrogator is controlled using standard SCPI syntax commands.

#### 5.1.1 **Command Syntax**

Each command is an ASCII string with arguments separated by ":" and terminated with the "Line Feed" and "Carriage Return" characters ("End of Line").




Fig. 5.1 TCP Communication Process

Commands for the Industrial BraggMETER SI are sent by port 3500. All commands, except for Continuous Acquisition (see page 47), are received via the same port. Continuous Acquisition answers are retrieved via port 3365.

There are several possible answers with error messages:

:NACK:INVALID COMMAND

The command does not exist. Check if the spelling is correct.

:NACK:COMMAND NOT ACCEPTED AT CURRENT STATUS

It is not possible to execute the command sent at the current status. Ask the current status of the interrogator (:STAT?) and confer with scheme from *Fig. 3.13* to see how to change it.




Fig. 5.2 NTP answer scheme (wavelength values)




Fig. 5.3 NTP answer scheme (engineering values)

#### 6.1 Software Version

This document refers to BraggMONITOR SI Software version v2.6.

This application is compatible with all FS22 Series 1S/s acquisition rate interrogators.

#### 6.2 Install and Uninstall Software

# 6.2.1 System Requirements

To operate the current version of BraggMONITOR, your PC must have the following requirements:

- Intel Pentium or equivalent processor upwards from 1 GHz
- Windows® XP (32 Bit and 64 Bit versions), Windows Vista® (32 Bit and 64 Bit versions), Windows® 7 (32 Bit and 64 Bit versions, Home, Professional or Ultimate editions) or Windows® 8/8.1 (32 Bit and 64 Bit versions) or Windows° 10 (32 Bit and 64 Bit versions)
- Main memory (RAM):
  - at least 512 Mbyte for Windows® XP
  - at least 1,024 Mbyte for Windows Vista®
  - at least 2,048 Mbyte for Windows®7 or higher
- Graphics card (and screen) with a resolution of 1,024 x 768 pixel or higher
- Approx. 1 Gbyte of free storage capacity for the program installation; at least a further 1 Gbyte is needed for the temporary storage of data; however you can also use a different drive for this.
- Ethernet interface (100/1000 MBit)

The above requirements are sufficient if you use low sample rates and some sensors. You must use a more powerful PC if you wish to use a large number of sensors with high sample rates.

#### 6.2.2 Software Installation

To install HBK FiberSensing BraggMONITOR SI Software on a PC, please follow the described steps:

- Insert the provided disk with software in the PC;
- Run Setup.exe inside BraggMONITOR folder;




Fig. 6.1 Run as administrator (once)

When the operating system is Windows Vista or higher, open setup.exe as an Administrator with a right-click (see Fig. 6.1).

## Information

Using windows display settings with the size of text not set to 100% might compromise the correct visualization of BraggMONITOR SI software.

#### 6.2.3 Software Uninstall

To uninstall the application, use the Add/Remove programs tool in Windows

- Enter control panel
- Select programs and features
- Select BraggMONITOR SI Software
- Click uninstall/change option and follow the steps.

# 6.3 Running the Software

## 6.3.1 Network Properties

To operate the interrogator, the PC network properties should be set so that both elements are configured in the same subnet.

To configure your personal computer so that it is on the same subnet as the default for the interrogator, proceed as described on section 3.6.1 "Network Properties".

#### 6.3.2 Run as Administrator

The BraggMONITOR SI Software should run with full administrator privileges. To have these privileges when the operating system is Windows Vista or higher, the user shall right-click the BraggMONITOR SI Software icon and then select the "Run as administrator" option (see Fig. 6.1).




Fig. 6.2 Set Run as administrator automatically

To configure the application to always open with Administrator privileges, right-click on the software icon and select "Properties > Compatibility". Check the box "Run this program as administrator" (see Fig. 6.2).

#### 7 BRAGGMONITOR SI USER INTERFACE

The BraggMONITOR SI Software graphical interface is divided into two different areas (Fig. 7.1):

- 1 General Bar
- 2 Graphical Area

#### 7.1 General Bar

The General Bar (number 1 in Fig. 7.1) is where the main acquisition actions can be performed. This bar is always on, although its buttons may be disabled due to the interrogator status.

On the left, general information is presented (see Fig. 7.2):

- On the first line interrogator configured date and time is presented.
- The second line is destined for the connection status to the interrogator.
- The last and third line is destined to inform the user on the current status of the interrogator and error messages. For attention, error messages are shown in orange (see Fig. 7.3).

#### 7.1.1 Date and Time

The BraggMONITOR SI Software uses by default the UTC defined time on the PC that it is operating with. The BraggMONITOR updates the interrogator date and time settings when it connects to the device. Data, either by using the BraggMONITOR or the internal memory of the interrogator, will be saved with this time stamp.

It is possible to change the BraggMONITOR SI Software time reference from UTC to the defined Local Time on your device. To do so, you should change the "config.ini" file that is on the Application folder.

- Close the BraggMONITOR application;
- Open and edit the Config.ini file;
- Change the parameter «UseUTC = "1"» to «UseUTC = "0"» and save the file (Fig. 7.4);
- ▶ Run the BraggMONITOR application as an administrator.




Fig. 7.5 Date and time window

The Time definitions on the PC can be checked and/or configured on the Control Panel under the Date and Time (*Fig. 7.5*).

To adjust the time zone, chose the "Change time zone..." button (Fig. 7.5).




Fig. 7.6 Date and time settings - time zone

To adjust the Local Time, chose the "Change date and time..." button (Fig. 7.5).




Fig. 7.7 Date and time settings - date and time

## 7.1.2 Connecting to the Interrogator

The first action to perform before starting an acquisition is to establish a connection between the interrogator and BraggMONITOR. For that, press the "Connect" button (number 1 in Fig. 7.8).




Fig. 7.9 Connecting via IP address

A popup window will appear to indicate/select the IP Address of the interrogator to which the connection will be established (see *Fig. 7.9*). This popup window also allows one to search for FS22 interrogators in the network. To perform this search the "search" button shown with number 1 in *Fig. 7.9* should be pressed.

After successfully connecting to the IP indicated, the "connect" button (number 1 in Fig. 7.8) changes to "disconnect" (Fig. 7.10).

# 7.1.3 Acquisition

## **Start Acquisition**

Whenever the software is connected to an interrogator and the software is on the Graphical View and Numerical View Tabs, the "start" button (number 2 in Fig. 7.8) becomes active, as shown in Fig. 7.11.

Press "start" button to start acquisition. This will start the acquisition and representation of the configured sensors.



#### Information

It is necessary to configure sensors in order to start an acquisition.




Fig. 7.12 Start and Stop button status

Once the "start" button is pressed, it will change its appearance to "stop" button (Fig. 7.12).

Measured values are represented in wavelength shift (in nm) relative to the central wavelength or engineering values, according to the formula defined on the Configuration tab (see section "Add, Edit and Delete Sensor(s)" on page 79). It is possible to obtain absolute values of temperature, strain, acceleration, etc. However, a sensor configuration must be defined.

# **Saving Data**

To save data, press the "save" button (number **3** in *Fig.* 7.8). The data will be saved in the path specified in the field "Data Folder" on the Configuration tab (see section "Data File" on page 81).

The button will change its appearance stating the software status (see *Fig. 7.13*). It will also change its appearance whenever the mouse is on top of the button stating the action to perform.

To stop recording, uncheck the "saving" button.

## **Saved Data Files**

Saved data file collects the data between the instant the save button is pressed and the instant it is pressed back.

Data sets will be recorded in .txt files automatically named, as follows:

BraggMONITOR SI Data [YYYY.MM.DD.HH.MM.SS; YYYY.MM.DD.HH.MM.SS].txt.

The YYYY.MM.DD.HH.MM.SS parts of the filename represent the start and finish, respectively, of the period during which the data has been saved.




Fig. 7.15 Data in data file

Data is organized in columns (see Fig. 7.15). The first row is a header indicating how many samples were acquired per second. The second row is a header containing the labels of each column:

- 1 1st column UTC or Local Date (according to what is configured) with format «DD-MM-YYYY»
- 2 2nd column UTC or Local Time with format «HH:MM:SS »
- 3 3rd column Sample number
- 4 Following columns Sensor name (Central wavelength (nm); formula) ordered by optical channel and then by wavelength. The values along these columns represent either wavelengths (in nm) or engineering values (units in accordance with Formula from Configuration tab) of the corresponding sensors.

**Opening Data in**To import the data file to a Microsoft Office Excel Workbook proceed as follows:




Fig. 7.16 Import data in Excel




Fig. 7.17 Select data file




Fig. 7.18 Text Import Wizard 1/3




Fig. 7.19 Text Import Wizard 2/3




Fig. 7.20 Text Import Wizard 3/3

# **Stop Acquisition**

To stop the acquisition, press the "stop" button (*Fig. 7.12*), on position number **2** in *Fig. 7.8*. It will return to the state showed in *Fig. 7.11*.

# 7.1.4 Software and Interrogator Information

General information about the software and the interrogator can be displayed by pressing the "info" button (number 4 in Fig. 7.8).

# 7.1.5 Exit Application

To exit BraggMONITOR SI Software application, press the Exit button (number **5** in *Fig. 7.8*).

# 7.2 Graphical Area

The graphical area is divided into five tabs:

- Graphical View
- Numerical View
- Spectral View
- Configuration
- SCPI Interface

# 7.2.1 Graphical View




Fig. 7.22 Graphical View

On the Graphical View, graphical representation of the measured values can be found over time (number 1 in Fig. 7.22).

It is possible to enable and disable the graphical representation of one or more sensors by checking and unchecking the check boxes (number **2** in *Fig.* 7.22). The displayed sensors can be changed by clicking on the scroll down menus along the right-hand side of the interface (number **2** in *Fig.* 7.22).

## Zooming

The graphical display automatically adjusts its vertical scale to fit all the measured values. Nevertheless, it is possible to manage the graphical representation using zoom in and zoom out functions.

The zoom in functionality is always on. To zoom in along the vertical axis drive the mouse arrow to the graphical area and press the left mouse button while moving the mouse up or down. This way a zoom in section will be defined. Once the desired Zoom In section is defined, release the left mouse button. The display will show the zoomed in section only.

In order to zoom back to full scale, press the zoom fit button (number 3 in Fig. 7.22).

It is also possible to modify vertical axis scale by clicking and inserting the axis numbers, identified with number **5** and **6** in *Fig.* 7.22.

The represented time interval (on the horizontal axis) can be selected from the Time Interval drop-down menu (number **7** in *Fig. 7.22*). The horizontal scale cannot be manually changed.

#### **Clear Representation**

Data represented on graphical display can be erased by pressing the clear button (number 4 in Fig. 7.22).

#### 7.2.2 Numerical View




Fig. 7.23 Numerical View

The Numerical View tab shows the acquired measurements for each sensor, organized by optical channel as shown in *Fig. 7.23*. For each channel there are two columns, one with the name of the sensors and another with wavelength shift (in nm) relative to the central wavelength or engineering values (units defined by the sensor Formula in Configuration tab) (number 1 in *Fig. 7.23*). Next to the channel identifier, the number of sensors detected in that channel is stated (number 2 in *Fig. 7.23*).

## 7.2.3 Spectral View

The Spectral View tab is only accessible when data acquisition is stopped.




Fig. 7.24 Spectral View - Smart Peak Detection (SPD)

This tab represents the spectral response of the sensors connected to the interrogator. The full spectrum contains 20001 data points corresponding to the reflected optical power in dBm from 1500 nm to 1600 nm with a 5 pm sampling resolution (number 1 in *Fig. 7.24*).

The spectral monitor can only represent one channel at a time. Channel selection can be done at the Channel scroll down box (number **10** in *Fig. 7.24*).

The BraggMONITOR can now be used to activate and configure two methods for FBG sensor detection. A conventional method (ranges OFF) that uses a global threshold and the Smart Peak Detection (ranges ON) that uses the threshold individually inside each sensor range.

# Ranges

Using the "ranges on/off" button (number **3** in *Fig.* 7.24) the user may select which FBG sensor detection method will be used.

When ranges are ON (see Fig. 7.24), the spectral graph will display the range associated with each sensor that is listed in the Configuration tab and the respective threshold used for the FBG peak computation. Even when multiple peaks occur inside one range, only one FBG sensor will be detected.




Fig. 7.25 Spectral View - Conventional detection method

When the ranges are OFF (see Fig. 7.25), the spectral graph will contain the optical spectrum of the selected channel and an horizontal line representing the threshold level considered for the detection of the FBG sensors.

On the right side of the spectral view tab, below the optical channel selector, one can find info regarding the detected sensors (number **12** in *Fig. 7.24*).

## Conventional Measurement Method

When the conventional method for FBG sensor detection is selected only the "Wavelengths" table is displayed (see Fig. 7.25). In that table it is possible to observe the wavelengths of the detected sensor peaks (WL (nm)) and the corresponding powers (PWR (dBm)). Below the "Wavelengths" table a numeric indicator shows the number of detected sensors on the selected channel (number 11 in Fig. 7.24).

### SPD Measurement Method




Fig. 7.26 Plot ranges

When the Smart Peak Detection method is selected, besides the "Wavelengths" table, the "Ranges" table is also presented (number 1 in Fig. 7.26), in which the lower (Min. (nm)) and upper (Max. (nm)) limits of each sensor range are displayed. These limits can be manually edited here by the user by clicking on each box to be edited.

The "Plot Ranges" checkbox (number **2** in *Fig. 7.26*) can be used to activate or deactivate the display of the ranges limits on the spectral graph.

### **Threshold**

The threshold value is defined for each channel, independently of the FBG sensor detection method, through the "set thrhld" button (number **7** in *Fig.* 7.24). The "get thrhld" button (number **5** in *Fig.* 7.24) can be used to return the threshold value that is stored for the selected optical channel on the interrogator.

The threshold value can be defined from 0 to 60 dB and corresponds to the considered power level for the FBG peak computation, so that side lobes and ground noise are disregarded.

The threshold value is updated every time the "spectral view" tab is selected.



### **Important**

Measurement settings can influence sensor readings.

# Conventional Measurement Method

SPD Measurement Method When the ranges are OFF, the threshold is defined for each channel and is the same for all the sensors in that channel, see *Fig. 4.4 on page 30*.

When the ranges are ON, the Smart Peak Detection is active, allowing the effective use of the high dynamic range offered by the interrogator through the introduction of a threshold referenced to the peak on each sensor's configurable range (refer to Fig. 4.5 on page 31). As in the conventional measuring method, the threshold value corresponds to the considered power level for the FBG peak computation and it is defined in dB for each optical channel individually.

### **Autoscan**

The autoscan functionality is used to detect the FBG sensors and to store the resulting configuration when its result is successful.

Upon an autoscan, Sensor Names are set by default as CHX.SABC, where X is the optical channel and ABC is the number of the sensor on that optical channel sorted by wavelength in ascending order.



### **Important**

After an autoscan is successfully performed, the resulting configuration overwrites any previously existent one.

Conventional Measurement Method

SPD Measurement Method In the case the ranges are OFF, the autoscan procedure will detect the sensors that are above the specified threshold. This threshold is referenced to the highest peak on the spectral trace.

For the case in which the ranges are ON, besides the threshold level, the autoscan procedure also takes into consideration the width of the ranges to detect the FBG sensors. When performing the autoscan with this method a pop up will appear for selecting the desired range width (see Fig. 7.27). The FBG sensor peaks are automatically detected accordingly to the autoscan threshold value. The minimum autoscan threshold value is 1dB, being the maximum limited to 30dB. The minimum admissible range width is 0.5 nm while the maximum is 100 nm.

Ranges maximum and minimum wavelengths will be set as the detected central wavelength of the FBG (displayed on the "Wavelengths" table as in number **12** in *Fig. 7.24*) plus/minus half the range width. Maximum and minimum range limits can then be changed on the "Ranges" table (number **1** in *Fig. 7.26*).



### **Important**

If the autoscan detects errors like overlapping ranges, it will show the error message and will not be considered valid. The latest successfully defined configuration will be active.

# Zooming




Fig. 7.28 Zoom section




Fig. 7.29 Zoomed spectum

The spectral graph can be zoomed in or out. The Zoom In tool is available every time the cursor is on the graph area. Zooming In is only possible over the horizontal axis. By pressing the left mouse while moving the mouse to the left or right, a Zoom In section will appear (*Fig. 7.28*). Once the desired zoom in section is defined, release the left mouse button and the display will show the Zoomed In section only (*Fig. 7.29*).

In order to zoom back to full scale press the Zoom Out button (number 8 in Fig. 7.24).

# **Saving Spectral Data**




Fig. 7.30 Saved spectrum file

To save spectral data, press the "save data" button (number **8** in *Fig. 7.24*), then select the file path to define the folder where data is stored and define the file name. Data sets will be recorded in .txt format for a single sweep (see *Fig. 7.30*). The save button will automatically return to its default state.

Saved data file is organized in columns (see Fig. 7.30), meaning:

- 1 1st column wavelength values in nanometers
- 2 2<sup>nd</sup> column optical power values in dBm.

The "save image" button allows one to save a .bmp file containing an instant capture of the displayed spectral graph (number **9** in *Fig.* 7.24).

### 7.2.4 Configuration

Acquisition configuration allows one to perform sensors configuration. To accomplish this step correctly, sensors' calibration sheets might be needed.




Fig. 7.31 Configuration View

# **Clear configuration**

If an old configuration is set, it is possible to clear it and start a new configuration pressing button "new" (number 11 in Fig. 7.31). Be aware this operation will discard all previous configurations of all channels.

# Add, Edit and Delete Sensor(s)

In order to Add a sensor to a configuration, the user is required to fill the fields (Name, Central wavelength (nm), Range Min. Value (nm), Range Max, Value (nm) and Formula) in the table (number **2** in *Fig.* 7.31). In the end, the new sensor is automatically sorted in the list by ascendant order using its central wavelength (nm). If any error is detected (for example, the Range Min. Value (nm) is higher than the central wavelength (nm) an auxiliary message is displayed in the "General Bar".

To Edit a sensor, the user can manually edit the fields corresponding to that particular sensor. The user can also delete a single sensor or all the sensors in an optical channel,

either selecting a sensor or the channel, respectively, and then pressing the "delete" button.

### **Test configuration**

Test Configuration (number **3** in *Fig. 7.31*) allows the user to check the current values from each sensor according to its configuration. Measured values will be displayed on the central wavelength field, in accordance to the defined formula for the sensor.



### Information

Error code -998 will be displayed when no sensor is found within a range.

### **Data File Definition: Path and Length**

As referred on section "Saved Data Files" on page 65, data sets are named automatically.

The path for file saving and the maximum duration of each file can be defined under the Configuration Tab.


By opening the "Data Folder" box (number **7** in *Fig.* 7.31) the default files path can be searched and defined

The "File Interval" (number **6** in *Fig.* 7.31) will define the maximum length of each saved file. Consecutive files will be created every time the defined time is achieved. The duration of the files can be set to: 1 min, 5 min, 10 min, 15 min, 30 min, 1 Hour, 2 Hours, 3 Hours or 6 Hours.

### Save and Load configuration

The configuration is stored in the interrogator and updated while starting the BraggMONI-TOR SI.

Any defined configuration can be saved in .txt extension file by pressing the "Save" button (number **9** in *Fig. 7.31*) and choosing a save path.






Fig. 7.32 Configuration file (ranges on)

The header of the file indicates whether it contains information of a configuration with ranges OFF ([RANGES;OFF] - Fig. 7.32) or with ranges ON ([RANGES;ON] - Fig. 7.33).

Conventional Measurement Method

For the case of a configuration without ranges, only the Name (number 1 in Fig. 7.33) and Central wavelength (nm) (number 2 in Fig. 7.33) are stored. This file might be edited in Notepad or Excel (see "Opening Data in Microsoft Excel" section on page 67) and saved as .txt extension file after editing.

# SPD Measurement Method

In the case of a configuration with ranges ON, for each channel there are 5 columns: Name (number 1 in *Fig.* 7.33), Central wavelength(nm) (number 2 in *Fig.* 7.33), Range Min. Value (nm) (number 3 in *Fig.* 7.33), Range Max. Value (nm) (number 4 in *Fig.* 7.33), and Formula (number 5 in *Fig.* 7.33).

Configuration file can always be loaded by the user by pressing the Load button (number **8** in *Fig. 7.31*) and selecting the file containing the desired configuration (see *Fig. 7.34*).

### **Change IP Address**




Fig. 7.35 Change IP address

To change the IP address of the interrogator, you must be connected and access the Configuration tab. To check if the status is connected please refer to the connection status message displayed on the left of the General Bar. Press the change IP button to pop-up the change IP Address interface (see Fig. 7.35).

Define the new IP Address (number **2** in *Fig.* 7.35). The Subnet Mask (number **3** in *Fig.* 7.35) will be automatically defined according to the IP Address. The Gateway is 0.0.0.0 by default and is user changeable (number **4** in *Fig.* 7.35). Then, press the Change IP button (number **1** in *Fig.* 7.35). The following procedure and status messages will be shown:

- 1. Interrogator is restarting. This can take more than a minute. Please wait.
- 2. Ping to interrogator is successful. Please wait.
- 3. Interrogator is ready.

After this process is complete, the connection will be established with the new IP.

### **Internal Memory Management**

The data files created during scheduled acquisitions are saved into the internal memory of the interrogator (see "Scheduled Acquisition" section on page 53 for details).




Fig. 7.36 Manage internal data memory

To view the file list and download the data stored in the internal memory press the "memo data" button on the number **5** in *Fig. 7.31*. This button launches a pop up (see *Fig. 7.36*). Once a file is selected, on number **1** in *Fig. 7.36*, it is possible to download it by pressing the "download button" (number **2** in *Fig. 7.36*) or delete it using "delete" button (number **3** in *Fig. 7.36*). The files will be downloaded to the chosen directory on number **4** in *Fig. 7.36*.

### 7.2.5 SCPI Interface

This tab allows the user to send Standard Commands for Programmable Instruments (SCPI) to the equipment. Please refer to the available command list in section 5 "Remote Communications" on page 38.

Commands are inserted on the command field (number **2** in *Fig. 7.37*) and sent by pressing Enter on the keyboard or the "send cmd" button (number **3** in *Fig. 7.37*). The interrogator's answers appear on the Reply field (number **1** in *Fig. 7.37*). Each time new answers are displayed, older ones are pushed down.

Each time a new command is successfully executed, a shortcut at the scroll down box is created, as shown in *Fig. 7.38*.

### Important

When the user leaves SCPI Interface tab, interrogator status is changed and Scheduled and Continuous acquisitions are disabled. In order to keep the current interrogator status, the user shall not select other tab than the SCPI Interface one and the BraggMONITOR application shall be closed using the "exit" button.

The list of replies can be cleared by pressing the "clear" button (number 4 in Fig. 7.37).

### **Firmware Update**

It is possible to upgrade/downgrade the firmware version of the FS22SI by pressing the upload firmware button (number **5** in *Fig.* 7.37).

- Download the new version of the firmware from the product page from HBM website (www.hbm.com).




Fig. 7.39 Firmware update

- Select the file on the pop up of the Select Image File interface (see Fig. 7.39).




Fig. 7.40 Update info window

The firmware upload process is performed automatically, being the FS22SI rebooted after completion and a successful update pop up message is depicted once the communication with the FS22SI is reestablished (*Fig. 7.40*).
